SUPERVISOR COMMENTS

Swing shift was steady with self-initiated activity and calls for service. When we arrived for work, dayshift, along with SCU, were already working a crash scene from a pursuit. An organized retail crime crew stole from Home Depot and fled in a vehicle when officers attempted to stop them. A short pursuit ensued and the suspects crashed near Foodmax. The male driver fled on foot, leaving his injured female passenger in the car. The male was located and arrested for numerous charges, including grand theft, felony evading, and felony hit&run. The female was also arrested. Both had to be transported to a hospital for medical clearance prior to booking. Officers arrested three males and one female this evening for warrants. Three were booked and one was cited. One of the males booked had warrants out of Manteca. He was called in as a hazard, stumbling in and out of traffic and rolling around in ditch. He was under the influence of drugs and sweating profusely. Public intoxication charges were added.
